History

It has been a very busy two terms for the History Department.

Key Stage Three:

In term 5 we studied the measly, miserable, Middle Ages. We looked at the gruesome symptoms of the Black Death, and questioned whether as some believed, strapping a live chicken to your armpit might provide a cure for the pernicious plague. Our lessons included role plays, diary entries, research from medieval sources and designing and making our own Black Death board games. We then went on to ask why the peasants were revolting forty years later. Was the revolt a right, royal success or a ruinous riot?

Term 6 took us to perhaps the most famous family dynasty in history. Not the Ewings, but -The Tyrannical Tudors. They make the Kardashians appear a perfectly normal, respectable functioning family unit. Our Tudor Family Tree began with a Henry who hated spending money and married the wife to be (or not to be as it turned out) of the King he had just butchered at Bosworth and left for dead under a car park in Leicester. We studied those bones and found out why scientists are so sure they are the remains of the last of the Plantagenets – Richard 'Lump of foul deformity' III. Henry Tudor the sequel came in the humongous form of an especially Horrid Henry with a penchant for wives, sharp blades and divorce papers. He didn't like the rules of the Church to which he belonged so decided to set up his own – giving it the fantastically original title – The Church of England. Short of money – Divorces never come cheap – this Henry, because he felt like it and he could, closed down all the monasteries and took all their money. This funded two years of pointless unwinnable wars with France and countless joust-thru McDonalds. The Eighth Henry had three children who spent most of their time arguing about whether or not to keep their Dad's small Church in England or go back to the big old one in Rome - it was the Brexit of its day. In our lessons we assessed whether Henry's son, Edward's reign was even worth talking about - (he didn't last long). Was the eldest daughter Mary a religious fanatic who shouldn't be let near any matches, or simply misunderstood? We finished with Elizabeth I – why did she paint herself white? What was with the black teeth? Was the Armada victory a lucky fluke? Was it her Dad cutting her Mum's head off that put her off marriage? Was her age indeed Golden or a case of all that glitters is not gold?



Next year our topics will include a Civil Rights movement in America attempting to address civil wrongs, and a Civil war in England which, as it turned out, was far from civil.

Key Stage Four:

The Industrial Revolution was our topic for Term 5. We studied how Britain changed from a rural, agricultural and insignificant Island at the cold and dull end of Europe to become a World Wide expansive Empire. Was it the result of scientific innovation, population change and radical progression in transport or did we just happen to be in the right place at the right time?

In Term 6 we started the AQA GCSE History course. This is where the work really begins. Our first topic was the reign of Elizabeth I. The pupils have engaged with GCSE style exam

questions with great success, demonstrating fantastic subject knowledge and understanding. This GCSE journey will be tough but if History has taught us anything it is that fortune favours the bold!

Term 6 also saw the start of the all new History Club – 'From Romans to Rockets, and everything in between'. So far we have replicated Naval Flag signals used at the Battle of Trafalgar, created our own Heraldic Coats of Arms and mummified a willing 'volunteer'.





We also have a new display board in the corridor. Every week it features examples of excellent work completed in class, the names of the Key Stage Historians of the Week, History in the News and information about The History Club.

Work Experience

It has been another successful year for work experience. This year, the students were encouraged to find their own placements and the feedback from their employers has all been very positive. It was a great opportunity for them to undertake some work experience in an area that they were interested in or wanted to pursue as a future career.

It was a pleasure to visit each student at work and to hear about their success stories.

Computing Department

It has been another successful summer term in the computing department with students achieving success in a range of different creative projects

Year 7

This term year 7 have been learning about image editing and also planning and creating stickman animations using Pivot software.

Year 8

This term year 8 have also been planning and creating more advanced 2d animations using DrawPlus software.

Year 9

This term year 9 have been learning about video editing and editing videos of their own creation.

Year 10 and 11

Students at Key stage 4 have continued to work hard towards achieving a level 1 or level 2 Functional Skills certificate in ICT, a nationally recognised vocational qualification that prepares students well for the ICT skills they will need to use both in college and/or in the workplace. Year 11 will be gaining their awards this summer.

Music

Year 7

Year 7 pupils have been composing mood music to accompany a film made in Drama Club. We hope to put a mix of some of the soundtrack music onto our YouTube channel, www.youtube.com/user/goldwynmusic . The pupils went on to improve their instrumental or vocal skills. Some decided to form a class band to perform songs of their choice.

Year 8

The Summer Term saw the start of our Year 8 Samba Batucada drumming school! The pupils picked up the rhythms quickly and worked together to play the grooves and breaks, responding to the leader's signals. Pupils then composed music that could accompany different scenes in a video game. A selection of the best examples will be available on our YouTube channel, soon.

Year 9

Year 9 pupils have done well in learning to play all the instrumental parts in the 'Crab Rave' and then re-creating the entire piece as a class, using Cubase audio software. They then made their own music video to accompany their recording, including crab masks and use of a green screen! The final video will hopefully be available on our YouTube channel, soon.

Year 10

Year 10 BTEC Performing Arts (Music) students have worked hard to learn all about how 'mashups' work, then create their own 'mashup' from songs of their choice. They were very creative in their decisions and the final 'mashup' amazingly combines at least 5 songs. Watch out for the audio recording on our YouTube channel.

Instrumental Lessons

10 pupils have been receiving individual keyboard and drums tuition from Andrew Parry Music tutors, this term. A Headstart Talents and Interests grant has been used to enable some pupils to access on a set of 10 lessons.

Since coming back after the Easter holidays their has been a lot going on in the Geography department.


Year 7 students have started looking at different countries that are in Europe and will continue this when they come back in Year 8.
