Computing

What a fantastic start to the year we have had in Computing!

Year 8 have been researching their favourite recipes and using Notepad++ to create their own HTML pages, using many complex instructions to include bullet points, ordered lists, paragraphs, heading styles and adding images and linking the pages together. This project covered more advanced HTML instruction as an extension to the project they undertook last year; creating their own website about internet and computer safety. Well done, year 8, please let me know if you make any of these recipes at home! More recently, they have been using StikBots to create a stop motion animation. These are very nearly complete and I aim to upload them onto YouTube so that you can see them, they really are fabulous!

Year 9 have started studying the Pearson Functional Skills in ICT. So far, they have created a complex spreadsheet model based around a Zoo scenario. In the Functional Skills examination, the use of Excel carries a large portion of the grades available, therefore we will be returning to this regularly to enable them to be as confident as possible for when it comes to their examinations.

Year 10 and 11 have created an extremely complex spreadsheet model that calculates the profit/loss of a fictional event. In this project, they have had to research the cost of elements, such as food and drink items, decide on the use of space and therefore the number of people that can attend and also how much they are going to charge for entry and refreshments. They have used complex formulas on multiple sheets, such as vlookups. Following this, we have been working on past papers and their mark schemes in order to fully prepare the students for their examination.

Year 7

Year 7 have had a fantastic couple of terms settling in to Goldwyn.

The whole team have really enjoyed getting to know the children and building positive relationships. As part of the settling in process, we have enjoyed taking part in a variety of team building activities, such as biscuit bridges, saving Fred, the sweet worm, and making egg parachutes.

We have been really impressed by the children's maths knowledge. In lessons, we have been focusing on number - written methods for the four operations, multiples, factors, square numbers, cube numbers and prime numbers. Please keep practicing times tables with the children as this will really help them with future learning.

In English we have been taking inspiration from the graphic novel "The Savage" by David Almond. We have used a variety of different techniques to generate ideas for writing such as drama, art and hot seating. The children have really enjoyed the book and have identified with the characters and themes. We have been super impressed by the work they have produced.

In History, we have been learning about the Norman Invasion and Medieval Britain. The children have enjoyed acting as the contenders to the throne, making models of Motte and Bailey Castles and learning about Medieval Crime and Punishment.


In Art we have been studying the work of Hundertwasser. We got creative and messy with paper mache and made some fabulous hats.

History

Some years act as the hinges of history; they are the pivots, years so momentous that they become the defining point when everything changed, as the past became the future. Marked as it is by pandemic, economic crisis and massive social protest, will 2020 be one of those years? I suspect so. We have been part of a developing narrative, a story we will tell our grandchildren. We were there. We each played our roles, witnesses and active participants in evolving tangible history. In years from now our descendants will sit exam papers where they will be asked to analyse the Government's response to the pandemic or to assess the effects of Covid-19 upon different communities.

In this unprecedented context our History lessons have played an integral role in interpreting and understanding our place in this confusing and at times bewildering environment. History is in essence derivative, nothing is original, nothing happens in a vacuum, but rather as a consequence of prior events. In this regard much of our work in History this term can be intrinsically related to events of 2020.

Year 7's have studied the Medieval Back Death, a disease which killed 60% of the population of Europe, a virus with profound effects upon the economy,

lifestyles and workforce. A pandemic initially ignored, targeting the vulnerable and 'treated' with a variety of bizarre remedies, although not apparently bleach.

Year 9 pupils have also considered a period of pivotal societal change; the industrial revolution. An age in which small scale cottage industries with most people working from and around their homes, were replaced by mass production manufacturing requiring many to travel for their work. 2020 has seen a similar shift in many workforce expectations, albeit in reverse.


Our Year 10 GCSE work has focussed on a divided Europe, as a new political ideology developed in the 1930's to destabilise and undermine traditional values and belief systems. We have studied the political machinations of a charismatic and populist leader manifesting as a demagogue, undermining national votes, suppressing the media and inciting prejudice and hatred. Tactics mirrored across the pond in 2020?

Year 11 have studied the events leading to a proud sixteenth century nation state seeking independence from a European institution it deemed too influential, powerful and interventionist. Many see Henry VIII's divorce from Rome as the Brexit of its day.

I suggest that if we have learnt anything from this tumultuous year it might be that history does not belong to us, but rather we belong to it.

Science

During the last two terms the Science department has been very busy!



Year 11 are busy preparing for their GCSE's and are completing revision and also Core practical experiments, such as Electrolysis and preparing Copper Sulphate crystals. We have completed 16 out of the 18 Core practical's already! Students are also starting their independent revision with some exemplar work.



Year 10 have been studying the heart this term. They had great pleasure in dissecting the heart and looking at the four chambers and valves. They were able to identify the aorta! We also completed a practical where we looked at our heart rate before and after exercise.



Year 9 have started their GCSE course this year and have been learning about cells and how we they divide so we grow! They have also started their Core Practical experiments where they have observed numerous cells under the microscope and created DNA models.

Year 8 have been learning about Combustion and Fire safety. We have looked at the fire triangle and they are now able to work out what three things are needed to make a fire. They also have looked at chip pan fires and what **not** to do.



Year 7 have started their journey in Science and are now able to safely use bunsen burners and other basic science equipment. Students have also been using the bunsen burners to investigate how to separate sand, water and salt.



This term we have also started completing a CREST Science award during Student-Led-Learning. This allows students to pick a topic of their choice to complete a written report. This will lead to them achieving a certificate which can be used for future college and university applications.

Some of the students have been looking at what colour smoke flares they can create which could be used during Duke of Edinburgh. We have also been looking at water rockets and how to increase their distance and height.

Music

Music-making has been rather different this year as we've been unable to put on any performances in 2020. With the lockdown we turned to online ways to create music and discovered 'SoundTrap' for Education. Goldwyn now subscribes to this collaborative online music-making app and pupils can create and record their own music projects. Years 7 to 9 have had training in how to use the app which can be accessed from any device at school or at home. Year 8 pupils produced some catchy electronic dance music. Several older pupils have made full use of the features by working together to make beats, record vocals and mix their music.



Year 9 pupils had the opportunity to explore Reggae music and we learnt to play '3 Little Birds'. 9H made an excellent job of creating a reggae style version of Ed Sheeran's 'Shape of You'. Year 8 pupils have been working together to form class bands, playing their own choice of song. It is encouraging to see up-and-coming musicians and singers.

After the amazing results from our Year 11 leavers in the summer, our new Year 10 BTEC Performing Arts students have made a very promising start to the course. We hope that there will be opportunities to perform to an audience in 2021.

We are fortunate to have had the assistance of a former music pupil, Darrel Spendley, this term. He has been able to support the BTEC group and provide guitar and bass tuition to an increasing number of students.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the pupils, staff, parents, carers and governors of the school for their amazing support and encouragement over the years. I hope that Goldwyn will be able to inspire young people to enjoy creating and engaging with music and other creative arts for years to come.

Goldwyn is very lucky to be surrounded by a wide variety of wildlife.




Our site became a multi-site hub during the first lockdown for students across all
